This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Each of our three classes receives a 30-minute music lesson each week from a specialist music teacher from Cumberland Music Service. During these lessons children access the curriculum and have the opportunity to play a range of age-appropriate instruments in small class numbers.

In the 2024-2025 academic year each class have been using:

Hundred Acre Wood (Reception and Year One): Untuned percussion instruments

Narnia (Years Two, Three and Four): Recorders

Kensuke's Kingdom (Years Five and Six): Saxophones and French Horns

Children also attend a weekly singing assembly where they have the opportunity to sing as a whole school, learning songs that will be performed at seasonal events. These singing assemblies allow the children to sing as a whole school ensemble as well as in groups or rounds. Performances also allow opportunities for small groups and solo performances as well.

Singing is also used within the wider curriculum for cross-curricular opportunities such as using songs to help learn e.g. the Kapow Geography curriculum engages children with songs to learn about continents etc.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Currently we do not offer extra musical tuition as children are working in small class groups receiving instrument instruction.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Children have the opportunities in school to perform at seasonal or end of term events.

Yearly performances include the Harvest Festival, Christmas/Nativity Performance, and the end of Year Leaver's Assembly.

Other performances may take place depending on cultural relevance e.g. jubilee and coronation performances.

Children also have the opportunity to perform with their instruments, either to staff as an audience or to parents at end of year events.

In the future

- Looking at local performances and opportunities for our children to be part of an audience at music and performance events.
- Musical tuition for individual pupils or small groups depending on demand.
- More opportunities for music within the wider curriculum.
